Tourism will be adversely affected, as the many tourists who visit the Museum will have their "experience" reduced by such a poor and intrusive insertion into the streetscape and the views to and from the Museum. Bloomsbury has already lost too many historic buildings which have helped to make up the distinctive character of the district, and the proposed plans will have an additional, and severely detrimental impact. The carbon impact will also be significant - it has been clearly demonstrated that demolition and rebuilding (especially in modern materials and designs) is expensive in carbon terms and has a limited future life, compared to proper renovation of existing buildings using traditional methods. Planning permission for this development should be refused, and the developers should be required to submit plans which minimise the adverse visual and environmental impact of their development.
