## Assessment

The s.211 notification is for the removal of a holm oak from the front garden of a residential property that is situated within the Redington Frognal Conservation Area.

The small young multi-stemmed holm oak is highly visible from the public due to its location in the front garden of the property, close to the boundary with the highway. The tree is approx. 3.5m in height and is growing immediately beneath a large primary limb of a large, mature horse chestnut tree growing in the same property. This young tree is already showing signs of suppression and phototropism due to its close proximity to a larger dominant tree. The tree does not have long term potential due to the position in which it is growing.

The tree is not of a rare species and is of no known cultural or historic significance. This non-native tree is not considered to be a noteworthy example of its species and or to significantly contribute to the character and appearance of the conservation area.

The tree contributes to combating climate change and provides some degree of habitat potential but this is not robust enough justification for the council to object to the proposed works.

It is not expedient for the council to serve a tree preservation order to protect the tree.

The council does not object to the proposed works.
