One picture showing stone steps very close to a large tree seemed to indicate cracks in the steps, which could indicate a subsidence problem, but I could find no reference to this in the material provided. I also found no mention of what will be planted to replace so many felled trees. Surely, given the environmental and natural habitat impact, consideration and thought could be given to provide a different solution and one that is not so blunt and drastic, e.g. appropriate pruning, perhaps felling of a tree or trees that are really causing a problem, but there is no indication of this.
