Assessment

The s.211 notification is for the removal of six Leyland cypress tree from the rear garden of a residential property that situated within the Bartholomew Estate Conservation Area.

The Leyland cypresses are of minimal visibility from the public realm and are not considered to significant contribute to the character and appearance of the conservation area. This is a fast growing species of a large ultimate size which does not tolerate pruning well. Leyland cypress trees are not well suited to small residential rear gardens in urban areas.

The trees are not considered to be noteworthy examples of their species and not of a rare species. The tree sare of no known cultural or historic value and are of a non-native species of low biodiversity value.

The trees do provide some degree of habitat and help to combat climate change as do all trees but in accordance with the Planning Practice Guidance on tree preservation orders this is not considered robust enough justification for a TPO to be served.

The council has no powers to add conditions of any kind, relating to replacement planting or otherwise, when determining s.211 notifications.

It is not expedient for the council to serve a tree preservation order to protect the trees.

The council does not object to the proposed works.
