We understood the need to replace structural walls with columns in order to give a more open and more lettable floor plan. We welcome the prospect of the building being better used and the Avenue being enlivened by the footfall to the office entrance off it.
				However, we had some questions regarding the following elements of the proposed scheme:
				 We thought it would be better if a more of the corner 'rooms' could be preserved as such. Many of these had their own cornices etc. and would provide spaces for 'break-out' away from the general open office plans or indeed they could provide closed offices or small private meeting spaces.
				- We wondered why the entrance to the offices, off the pedestrian arcade, could not be more prominent ,even though it should undoubtedly be in the manner of the other entrances to the blocks. To make it a rather pallid and slightly awkward imitation of the shop fronts seems a missed opportunity. It is a major entrance, enlivening and enhancing the arcade and we felt that it should look the part. It could be in timber and glazing so as to be stylistically of the same family as the rest of the ground floor frontage.
				- We understand that in the 80's the central lightwell was infilled, robbing the splendid half-moon plan staircase of all natural light. This staircase is now proposed to be linked once more to the entrance it originally served. However, it seems a great pity not to take advantage of possible borrowed natural light to the staircase via the proposed office spaces. Privacy could be maintained either by the height of the windows or by obscured glazing. We understand that there were, historically, openings in the flat side of the staircase and these could be re-opened and reglazed to gain natural light.
