For those who need DIY supplies, there is already a Leylands store just a 9-minute drive away, which is a short and convenient trip.
				Local families are well-served by the existing high street hardware store, which caters to the community's needs. The proposed Leylands store's signage is an eyesore and not in keeping with the aesthetic of the local area. It is brash, unwanted, and unnecessary. A store that genuinely serves the residents' needs would be a much better fit for our community.
				Additionally, the influx of vans, trucks, and cars would create significant traffic issues, as there are no feasible parking options for these vehicles. Belsize Park is a highly desirable beautiful residential area with an extremely well known row of small, independent and in-keeping retail and F&B units near two major parks with a huge amount of effort put in to the appearance and natural features of the street. Whilst having Leyland as incoming tenant for the corner unit would not be out of keeping with the tenant mix along the Haverstock Hill shopping parade (and is a useful outlet to have), the proposed signage would be extremely out of keeping with the other retail units, surrounding architecture and natural features of the area. The frontage faces on to residential houses and flats and is the first thing that people see when arriving in to the area by car, bus or bicycle.
