Assessment

The s.211 notification is to prune a group of Bay trees (G1) back to the boundary of the applicant's rear garden and to reduce their height. The trees are growing in the rear garden of the neighbouring property, which is remove a private residence on Pilgrim's Lane, which is within the Hampstead Conservation Area.

The reasons for the proposed works are:

G1: Control encroachment/General maintenance.

G1 is not readily visible from a public place.

G1 is not of a rare species and from photographic evidence submitted by the owner, are not considered a noteworthy example of their species.

The group is of no known cultural or historical significance.

Given these considerations, it would not be expedient to serve a TPO to object to the proposed pruning operations as is being requested by the objector.

Under Common Law, the overhanging branches of a tree in a conservation area can be removed back to the boundary only, but reductions in height can only be carried out with the permission of the owner, which must be sought by the applicant and/or their agent. This will be made clear within the decision notice to be sent to the applicant, the agent and a copy to the owner.

The Council does not object to the proposed works.
