## **Assessment**

The s.211 notice is for the crown reduction of two black pine trees from the front garden of a residential property that is situated within the Redington Frognal Conservation Area.

The two pine trees are highly visible from the public realm and significantly contribute to the character and appearance of the conservation area. The trees are two of four black pine trees in the front garden of the property, the other two pine trees are subject to a TPO ref. H6 1954. The four trees collectively form a group and are visible from Langland Gardens and Lindfield Gardens.

The two trees are in at least fair condition physiologically and have a significant safe useful life expectancy. The trees form an important, uncommon landscape feature, provide habitat potential and help to combat climate change. This species is drought tolerant so is suited to the future climate of inner London.

Reducing the height of the trees by 2.5m and the spread of the trees would adversely affect the natural form of the trees. This would be harmful to the visual amenity the trees provide. The natural form of the trees would not grow back over time, the form would be permanently lost. Robust justification for the works has not been submitted.

In reference to Langland Gardens the Redington Frognal Conservation Area Character Appraisal and Management Plan 2022, section 4.17 states:

"Mature trees are in a property at the corner with Lichfield Gardens (sic), with smaller trees in some other gardens."

10 Langland Gardens is a property at the corner with Lindfield Gardens.

The tree provide a high level of public amenity, the proposed works would be harmful to the character and appearance of the conservation area.

It is recommended that a tree preservation order be served to protect the amenity the trees provide and the character and appearance of the conservation area.
