Identification of Tree(s) and Description of Works

Please identify the tree(s) and provide a full and clear specification of the works you want to carry out

This garden benefits from two mature trees at its boundary (T4 - lime tree and T7 - mature sycamore) and there has been little maintenance to the garden over a period of many years, leading to self-seeded juvenile trees, and overgrown shrubs.

T1 Laurel (height ~5m) – fell to ground. Reason: overgrown shrub with damage to trunk.

T2 Chamaecyparis tree (height ~7m) – fell to the ground. Reason: overgrown evergreen tree that has significantly died back to due proximity with other trees./

T3 Sycamore (height ~10m): fell to ground. A juvenile, self-planted tree with substantial damage to the trunk thought to be potentially fire damage, which represents a significant safety issue.

T4 Lime tree (semi-mature, potentially subject to a TPO, height ~13m): re-pollard. Reason: cyclical arboricultural management. This tree is located in my neighbours' garden in 109a Islip Street and they are aware of permission being sought for this work.

T5 Sycamore (height ~8m): fell to ground. A juvenile, self-planted tree crowding out semi-mature lime.

T6 Portuguese laurel (height ~5m) – overgrown shrub.

Note, no works are sought to T7 (~18m); however, this has been included to show that the garden benefits from a mature sycamore on its boundary.

You might find it useful to contact an arborist (tree surgeon) for help with defining appropriate work.

Sketch plan requirements

Your plan needs to show the precise location of the tree(s) in relation to nearby property/roads/boundaries. It should, therefore:

- indicate the main features of the site where the tree(s) stand and its surroundings; in particular, you should:
 - o mark and name surrounding roads
 - o sketch in buildings, including adjoining properties
 - o add house numbers or names
- mark the position of the tree(s) to which you want to carry out work and identify them by the number shown in the Tree Preservation Order where possible; if you use a different number, please make sure that this can be matched with your description of the tree(s)
- if there are many trees on the site, make clear which tree(s) are included in this application by:
 - $\circ~$ marking all trees on the plan, but only numbering those to which you want to carry out work
 - showing the approximate distance between the application tree(s) and buildings
 - o adding other relevant features on the site (e.g. greenhouse, paths)
