# Heritage Statement for 5 Talacre Road, NW5 3PH, London

# 1. Introduction

This Heritage Statement supports the planning application for 5 Talacre Road, located within the West Kentish Town Conservation Area. The proposal involves:

- Replacing the existing uPVC front door with a wooden panel front door.
- Replacing the existing uPVC window in the front entrance with a wooden window.
- Replacing a worn patio with new porcelain or ceramic tiles.

### 2. Site Description

5 Talacre Road is a residential property situated in the West Kentish Town Conservation Area, designated in 2005 to preserve the area's architectural and historical character. The conservation area is characterized by its Victorian terraces and uniform architectural features.

• Front Door and Window: Replacing uPVC elements with timber alternatives will restore the property's historical appearance, aligning with conservation guidelines that discourage the use of non-traditional materials like uPVC.

• Patio: Upgrading the patio with sympathetic materials will enhance the property's aesthetic without negatively affecting the conservation area's character.
