I have spoken to a tree expert - who believes that from a review of page 8 of the Auger report that the "root test results in all three holes do not provide enough material for identification - some of these are bark and not necessarily roots".  While I cannot attach pictures in this form - the tree in question is approx 12m from the neighbour's property, is in fine health, and has just started to grow leaves again for the spring. It contributes substantially to the landscape of the (busy) street and provides much needed cover. I strongly object to the removal of this healthy tree, and would instead suggest trimming of the crown and pollarding - I am speaking to the other freeholders to arrange for this and we will submit a planning application shortly.
