Site Description

Grade II listed terraced house dating from the early C19. Stucco fronted at ground level, stock brick above.

Assessment

It is proposed to erect a commemorative plaque to Sidney Bechet, pioneering Jazz musician, who lived at the property in 1922. The plaque is proposed by the Nubian Jak Community Trust with the support of the US Embassy and London Jazz Society. The Trust has installed a number of other commemorative plaques to notable figures, including a plaque to Mary Prince which is displayed on Senate House.

The plaque measures c. 450mm in diameter, and is made from cast aluminium, with white lettering on a blue background. It will be located on the building's front elevation ground floor level, positioned between the two windows. It will be minimally screw fixed into the stucco.

The proposed plaque is considered to reinforce local distinctiveness and to highlight the area's rich history. The scale, position, appearance and method of fixing of the plaque is not considered to harm the building's fabric, appearance or special architectural and historic interest.

Local and national policy considerations are met and the application is therefore recommended for approval.
