The Museum of London Archaeology Service has carried out a number of different phases of work on the site from 1992 to 2000 and under two site codes HST92 and HSN99. This event refers to excavation of Area A1 in June 1999, excavation of Area A2 in May 2000, Excavation of the remainder Area 2 in August 2000 and the watching brief on Area B1 in September 1999. The first phase of the development was a five floor office block and basement floor. The second consists of a residential and restaurant, with basement. The results of the combined fieldwork was presented in a single report. Residual Roman pottery sherds and fragments of human remains were found on site. A large east-west drainage ditch, probably running to the Fleet, was filled with domestic refuse which could be dated between 1150 and 1350. A number of later channels or sumps truncated the backfill of the ditch, dating to the middle of the fourteenth century. To the south of the ditch was a barrel well which was backfilled at the end of the fourteenth century. A possible medieval chalk wall truncated the topmost reclamation deposits over the ditch. Another chalk and brick wall dated to the late fifteenth century but most of the other post-medieval features were truncated by modern activity. Early nineteenth century brick culvert drains survived and may have been associated with a circular brick-lined well. The drains were truncated by a series of Victorian basements and modern dumps.
