Dear Kevin,

Reasons for my suggestion that we remove the willow tree are as follows.

The tree is damaged by disease and has some fire damage. The disease appears to be low down near the top of the main trunk and the lower parts of the main lateral branches. Cutting back to remove these damaged & unsightly parts would destroy the shape of the tree and would quite likely end its life anyway. The tree has been left to go wild over many years as far as I can tell.

The willow is a tree which seems more suitable for larger gardens due to it's rapid growth and not especially ornamental nature. The design for the garden will include planting a new tree slightly further back towards the North boundary. We are thinking of a classic tree which is suitable eg Prunus Kursar or one of the less vigorous deciduous Magnolias.
