Dear Mr Fisher

The Garden Flat, 21 Thurlow Road, Hampstead, NW3 5PP

I am writing to you following a conversation with Alex (from your Department) this afternoon.

We have recently moved to Hampstead and I am looking to do some tree work in the garden. When we lived in Gloucester Crescent (27) you were very helpful with advice and granting permission for work on the trees in our garden and I am hoping that I may look to you for some more advice regarding three trees in our new home.

Firstly, a eucalyptus which has a girth of some 180 cm has been planted about 20 ft from the back of the house and we were advised by our surveyor at the time of purchase to remove it before it causes damage to the foundations. This obviously needs to be done in two stages to minimise the risk of heave and since last year the existing owners pollarded the tree and removed the low laterals - stage one has already been done. What I would like to do now is to carry out stage two - ie remove the remainder before the spring gets too advanced and replace it with a smaller less invasive tree, a tree more fitting to the garden. I would appreciate some suggestions.

The second tree which I would like to fell is a rather sad conifer which is growing up through the cherry at the front of the house. The tree itself is struggling in its present position and there is little growth on the lower part and the top is rather weak. If left it will, I imagine ruin the cherry. In addition it also severely limits the afternoon sunlight to the remainder of our front garden.

As far as I am aware neither of the trees in our garden have TPOs.
