## PERMISSION FOR DEVELOPMENT (CONDITIONAL)

## STATEMENT OF APPLICANT'S RIGHTS ARISING FROM THE REFUSAL OF PLANNING PERMISSION OB ON THE GRANT OF REPMISSION SUBJECT TO CONDITIONS

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(In this statement, 'the Secretary,', means. 'the Secretary of State for the Environment'),

- If the applicant is aggrieved by the decision of the local planning authority to refuse permission or approval for the proposed development. or to grant permission or approval subject to conditions, he may appeal to the Secretary in accordance with Section 36 of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1971, within six months of receipt of this notice. (Appeals must be made on a form which is obtainable from the Department of the Environment, Caxton House, Tothill Street, London SWH 9LZ.) The Secretary has power to allow a longer period for the giving of a notice of appeal but he will not normally be prepared to exercise this power unless there are special circumstances which excuse the delay in giving notice of appeal. The Secretary is not required to entertain an appeal if it appears to him that permission for the proposed development could not have been granted by the local planning authority, or could not have been so granted otherwise than subject to the conditions imposed by them, having regard to the statutory requirements, (the statutory requirements are those set out in Section 36(7) of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1971, namely Sections 29(1), 30(1), 67 and 74 of the Act), to the provisions of the development order, and to any directions given under the order. He does not in practice refuse to entertain appeals solely because the decision of the local planning authority was based on a direction given by him.
- If permission to develop land is refused or granted subject to conditions, whether by the local planning authority or by the Secretary and the owner of the land claims that the land has become incapable of reasonably beneficial use in its existing state and cannot be rendered capable of reasonably beneficial use by the carrying out of any development which has been or would be permitted he may serve on the Common Council, a purchase notice requiring that council to purchase his interest in the land in accordance with the provisions of Part IX of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1971.
- In certain circumstances, a claim may be made against the local planning authority for compensation, where permission is refused or granted subject to conditions by the Secretary on appeal or on a reference of the application to him. The circumstances in which such compensation is payable are set out in Section 169 of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1971.
