3.8 Adapt existing railings to double folding

This measure is taken to improve the DDA access issues. It is subject to a thorough study by an ironwork specialist. If this solution happens to be too difficult to realise, the railings will be taken away from the building, or left as they are. The new handrail will be adapted accordingly.








Proposed railings 1:50

Thankyou very much for sending the very thorough brochure on your scheme for Endell Street. I found it sufficiently comprehensive to avoid the need, at least at this stage, to pay a visit.

Broadly speaking I think we can support the principle of the scheme. However there are three areas of initial concern

- a) The striking new gallery structure is meant to be in dramatic contrast to the Vulliamy original. This we understand and can support. But why must the front face (looking into the sanctuary) on each of the new floors be so waywardly irregular? There is more than a touch of the fashionably perverse about it in echo of the horror of the straight line shown by Zaha Hadid. Walls at irregular angles are not only restless to look at but create difficult angles to use. By all means introduce movement but why not curves echoing those of the apse at the other end of the sanctuary?
- b) Corralling the monuments together on two floors has a certain appeal but it is very important that regimentation be avoided. Because people die decades, even centuries apart, monuments are always going to look somewhat haphazard in their placing and there is virtue in that. They should not appear like portraits in a gallery
- c) We infer that the present railings within the central bay on the facade are to be removed. But why?

Swice Protestant Church, 79 Endell Street, London (grade II, G Vullianty, 1853-5) – proposed internal remodelling

Thank you for your latter and enclosures of 10 December 2007, notifying the Victorian Society of proposals concerning the above church, and also for kindly agreeing to send through the documents in electronic format. I had the pleasure of visiting the church earlier this month, and was shown round by David Levenberger and his colleagues. The proposals were subsequently discussed by our Southern Buildings Committee, whose response I now write to convey.

The Swiss Church is a fine and nobly-proportioned building by a distinguished 19°-century architect. Its international connections — having been designed and paid for by members of the Swiss community in mid-Victorian London, and used by their descendants for more than 150 years — give it a unique social and historical importance. It has suffered much from fire damage and from unsympathetic alteration, losing all of its original internal fittings and (thanks to the interwar remodelling of the lobby area) many of the spetial qualities that are its finest feature, it has also been subject to a poor-quality redecoration scheme, the result of which has been to give the building an appearance of premature dilapidation.

We therefore welcome the proposal to renovate and redecorate the building. The quality of the worship area will be much improved by the removal of the present gallery structure, and its replacement strikes us as a well-conceived modern intervention that responds well to the austere aeathetic of Vulliamy's interior. We do not object to the lowering of the floor or the extension of the basement area, provided this is done carefully so as to evoid damage to the historic fabric.

Out only concerns relate to two comparatively minor matters: the relocation of the memorial plaques from the main half to the entrance area, and the replacement of the windows on the main street front with new double-glazed units. The memorials, as well as documenting the history of the church and its congregation, also play a role in articulating the interior space. They are arranged in matching pairs (two in marble, then two in bronze, then two more in marble), placed equidistantly on either side of the half, presumably a deliberate design

choice on the part of the church's late 19" and early 20"-century congregation. We feel that transferring the monuments to the vestibule area would not (in the words of the consultation document) make them significantly 'more accessible for study purposes', and would deprive the main hall of a small but important part of its historic and visual character. We would therefore advise that they remain in situ.

As regards the windows, it is not clear from the application whether the existing sashes and casements are original to the building; if they are, then we would point out that government guidance on works to historic buildings – as embodied in Planning Policy Guidance 15, appendix C.40-49 – strongly advises against the replacement of original windows in listed buildings unless strictly necessary. In this case, we feel that secondary glazing placed behind the existing window frames would be preferable to new double glazing.
