With reference to the plans submitted with your letter dated 4th May, 1955, in compliance with the condition of the Council's termination dated 17th August, 1954, I am directed to inform you that the Council has decided to approve such detailed drawings (Read. No. 2431, your Nos. 1-11), except in so far as they shown tank and lift motor room above roof level, in connection with the erection of an office building on the sites of Not. 23-27, Sandland Street, 1-2, Gray's Inn Passage and 10-20, Red Lion Street, Holborn.

I have to inform you that:-

(1) Planning permission will be required for the erection of the lift motor and tank room, and it is unlikely to be granted for this development as shown on the present drawings as it is considered that such a structure on the roof will adversely affect the appearance of the building. In this respect you are vised to consult the Council's officers before preparing revised in all consult the councilies on application.
