I wish to express my objections to the above application

A few years ago our neighbours at 25, South Hill Park were granted permission to have a Basement created. Both their house, at no 25 and ours at no 27 had been fully underpinned in 1992 by 'Underpin and Makegood'. I pointed out this fact to their engineer, who didn't feel it was a concern. Several neighbours tried to stop the application going through, with no success. The guarantee that we had for the underpinning to our house then became null and void. The creation of the basement at no 25 took 15 months to complete, during which time the noise and dirt pollution were excessive and detrimental to my work as a music teacher working from home. Early on, our front door jammed, indicating the level of disturbance, and could only be opened after a large chunk of it was removed from the underneath of it, and our roof, which had recently been completely restored began to leak badly. The creation of basements have caused a great deal of grief to many long term residents of this street, and others nearby. Why does the Planning Department of Camden continue to overrule ordinary citizens right to protect their property from damage because of the selfish demands of people who are unsatisfied with the properties they own. If they need more room, why not get a bigger house?
