Objection to planning permission 2014/0321/P

Further to my earlier emails, and having now read the planning application and the statement by Stephen Johnson from St Giles, I comment further as following.

- He states that the extractor fan has been "operating continuously" since before November 2007. The previous restaurant was not a 24 hour restaurant, therefore the extractors were not operating continuously - they were turned off at night.
- The photographs submitted SHN1 and SJ1, are recent photos taken within the last year. The shutters that were concealing the extractor fan were taken down mid 2013. The council and also residents who live opposite were not aware of the extractor fan, because the St Giles Hotel had concealed their existence with the use of these shutters, knowing that it was illegal to install the extractor without planning permission, and also knowing that if they were visible, the residents living opposite would complain and object

I object to the extractor because of the fumes produced that waft across the road and have twice caused my apartment to smell like a grill restaurant. I can't leave my windows open for fear that the smell will come inside. The summer months I can't be expected to be shut up inside with no ventilation because of the nuisance and illegal installation of a the extractor fan opposite my flat.

The council has on 2 occasions visited my apartment to check for noise and smells, but on both occasions, the restaurant was not busy, and therefore the smell and fumes were not detected. The photos and video that I emailed you earlier however show exactly what happens when the restaurant is busy. Pedestrians

have to cross the road because of the pollution, and I have to shut my windows. This is a public nuisance and can't be allowed to remain.
