# Site Description

Senate House is Grade II \* listed and was designed by Charles Holden in 1932-38. The building is a monumental Portland stone faced structure which rises at its centre to an 18 storey tower. The building is a local landmark for the University of London and dominates Malet Street. The building also stands within the Bloomsbury Conservation Area.

Listed Building Consent (2008/1625/L) was **granted** on 11 July 2008 for "Internal alterations and formation of new library reception in third floor lift lobby area of Senate House."

#### **Assessment**

This application is for works to the existing Computer Study Area at 3<sup>rd</sup> floor level within the south block. Partitions were inserted in the 1990s in order to define this space. This room and the adjacent corridor were formerly the scullery to the adjacent Senate House kitchen.

It is proposed to install mobile shelving in this area in association with the adjoining library use. This would involve the removal of the existing plasterboard partition that divides this room from the adjacent corridor. The structural column in the centre of this partition is to be retained but with the plasterboard cladding removed. It is likely that there is a plain white tiled finish beneath the cladding which dates from when this space was used as the scullery. This finish is to be retained.

The proposals will only affect modern fabric of no intrinsic interest and consequently the special architectural and historic interest of the listed building will be preserved. Recommend approval.
