We, the residents of the residential block Redcroft, live opposite the proposed "eruv" boundary in Iverson Road. We wish to put in a total objection.

1. The space next to the Thameslink Station, on the corner with West End Lane, is one that us residents have fought tooth and nail over. The powers that be wanted to axe the beautiful lime trees, but residents won and the preservation orders were retained. I think that now even those who wished to destroy them will admit what a stunning feature they are and how they make the Saturday farmers' market look like a scene from Provence. We don't want any more street furniture in this area, however subtle, let's keep it clean and clear.

2. We object to the addition of any further street furniture in all the spaces as proposed for this eruv. We don't want clutter of any kind, especially as it will do nothing for the

infrastructure of our streets, it's not as if it's for vital services, such as electricity or waterworks.

3. We think it is wrong for the edifices of any religious beliefs to be forced upon us, and feel that they are dangerous and could pave the way for religious segregation in the future. One of the greatest aberrations of the last century was the second world war creation of "ghettoes" for the internment of people determined by their faith. The "eruv" is an uncomfortable echo of this for many of us who have Jewish blood. We feel that the so-called "eruv" is based on a crazy and hypocritical interpretation of the Bible.
