Demolition of existing carpark and ancillary structures and erection of new 7 storey building, located on Heath Strange Garden site facing west to Hampstead Green footpath and Rosslyn Hill, containing 9620 sqm laboratory/research space for Institute for Immunity and Transplantation, a patient hotel, Royal Free Charity offices plus a replacement carpark of 58 spaces, replacement garden, plant and landscaping, all ancillary to Royal Free Hospital (Class C2

Recommend No Archaeological Requirement

Thank you for your consultation dated 14 November 2014.

The Greater London Archaeological Advisory Service (GLAAS) provides archaeological advice to boroughs in accordance with the National Planning Policy Framework and GLAAS Charter.

Having considered the proposals with reference to information held in the Greater London Historic Environment Record and/or made available in connection with this application, I conclude that the proposal is unlikely to have a significant effect on



heritage assets of archaeological interest.

Although situated within an Archaeological Priority Area, the applicant's deskbased assessment indicates that there is little potential for significant remains to survive due to the scale of modern ground disturbance.

No further assessment or conditions are therefore necessary.
