Reducing car parking, green space and removal of the access road would all be deleterious because of the impact of reduced hospital parking on neighbouring streets, loss of light from the bulk and size of the proposed building, and increased traffic congestion in Pond Street which at present often prevents speedy access to or egress from the hospital. Add to this that most of the proposed 'improvements' do not need to be tacked on to the present hospital building — the Immunology and Transplant Institute appearing to be the main exception where there may be a need for it to be adjacent to the main building housing operating theatres. Most of the other facilities could easily be housed elsewhere including the provision of hotel beds for visitors. This has the hallmark of an ill-considered and over intrusive planning proposal. The fact that the Royal Free's original 1960s architectural impact lacked the sensitivity demanded of big projects in small communities should not excuse the excesses of this application. Please refuse this application with the advice that a smaller, more relevant plan should be put forward taking visitor and community considerations into account. Alex Finer
