dear Mr Thuaire,

I write to you as an extremely concerned South End Green resident and parent of a child attending Hampstead Hill School. I am also a Medical Hospital Consultant working locally for the NHS.

Currently, the Pond Street area is traffic laden with all the appointments and ambulances attending and trying to enter the Royal free Hospital from a usually grid-locked street. Apart from the appalling pollution for the children especially, the traffic endangers lives on a daily basis as stressed people in cars running late for appointments and finding nowhere to park become preoccupied with trying to enter the hospital at all costs, losing the priority that should be road safety. On a daily basis, we cross the road at the Pond Street pedestrian crossings at our peril. This is a narrow but major thoroughfare. The idea that another huge building with more comings and goings in such a grid-locked area would be built leaves us in utter trepidation. This is also in complete contradiction to the recent Environmental Audit Commission Report, which clearly states that schools should not be in traffic laden areas because the research now indicates that pollution is killing as many people as cigarette smoke. Apart from the local residents and workers, there are over 1000 children attending three schools in the immediate vicinity.

Hampstead Hill School is a family run local school, opened since 1949 and provides excellent education for the local children from all walks of life. The small amount of open space left is crucial for the well-being of hundreds of children. The idea that this huge building right next to the school, over-shadowing the classrooms and small open play areas, depriving the children of light and privacy - raising Child Safe-Guarding issues too - defies common sense. The few trees left would by and large, be removed. Furthermore, the magnificent but fragile grade 1 listed building that houses the school and is available again to the local community, could be put at structural risk. The local community, spear-headed by Andrea and Michael Taylor's amazing fund-raising efforts, actually rescued this building at great cost and the possibility that this would now be jeopardised by foundations next to it for a 'sky-scaper', plunging it into darkness as well, fills us with despair. This would be a huge

blow to everyone who contributed financially to this rescue and restoration project, a plac which has become the local hub of community life and events.

As a doctor, I also of course support research into illnesses but the idea of building a research centre into illnesses by causing other illnesses does not make any sense. Children, local residents, patients, local workers are already risking their respiratory lives on a daily basis - we simply cannot allow further endangerment of lives. We would fully support planning for such a building for research in an appropriate area.

I wish to object to the Planning application 2014/6845/P- Royal Free hospital

My reasons are as follows

- The traffic on Pond street Haverstock Hill and surrounding areas is already very bad. At 9 am the traffic is at a standstill all the way up Roslyn Hill past to Willoughby Road. These single lane roads cannot cope with the amount of general and school traffic at the moment so extra capacity at A&E ie 60,000 people to 140,000 people and less parking spaces will only worsen the already bad situation.
- The upheaval of such a large construction will clog the area. The construction is too big.
- The Royal Free has a research facility and this scheme has factored in more research space. Working in this area of expertise I would not recommend the Royal Free as a research centre, it is limited and will always be limited. UCL has recently expanded its research facilities and the Crick Institute will be state of the art research centre on a huge site by the British Library and is opening next year. These should be the research hubs for North London, they are on the same network. Clinical material can easily be taken to these points only about 3 miles away. The research world is understanding that we must have engineering, computing, physics, new imaging and medical scientific work altogether. This will never be possible in the confined space of the Royal Free and should not be considered. All research should move to the fantastic new institutes being built near by and who are part of their network

• All in all each of these elements together with the already over developed site and lack of master plan should be reasons not to build the scheme. The 1970's Royal Free building and other out buildings could and should be reconfigured and the redundant and empty space should be better utilised and then consider a new site added once these first stages are complete. Building more is not an answer.

It was brought to my attention that a planning permission is sought by the Royal Free Hospital to make a further extension.

I wish to object to the application on several points:

It is simply too big. The Royal free is already a monstrosity and completely over developed for the site. The residential area is dwarfed in the shadow of the hospital which looks absolutely industrial. It was totally irresponsible from the start... The constant additions have turned into one of the most the most monstrous sites in London. The New proposal will make the situation even worse! Just a year or so ago a new generator was added next to our flats in the Panoramic ... just outside many of the bedrooms! Not the constant 24/7 noise is a disturbance (no windows can be opened!) it is also bathed in floodlights which forced many of the residents to invest in black out measures. Moms and dads often double park on Hampstead Hill Gardens.

The Royal free is already an architectural eyesore and a huge blot on the local area which is otherwise beautiful. St Stephens is a Grade 1 listed building with a charm and importance all of its own. Building a new 7 storey block threatens the beauty of the area still more, encroaches upon the last remaining local and valuable green spaces, threatens the foundations of the church and the school located in its grounds, at worse threatens the very existence of that family run, non-selective, highly rated local school and at best affects it's day-light and the privacy and security of the children who go there
