I would like to object to the above on grounds of the following

1. Lack of light. There is a wooden fence that was erected on top of an existing brick wall which divides the gardens of house number 11 and 13. The wooden fence was erected on top of the brick wall by the previous owners, without planning permission, and in breach of the Ancient Light right. The existing brick wall was already very high. Mr Alan Gillespies was trying to help me with this matter, but the previous owners denied Camden access to measure the height of the wall from their side. The previous owners became rather abusive towards me, and so I was not able to pursue the matter further, and under duress, has to ask that Camden put it on hold, as I could not cope with the abuse, and just wanted to live in peace. I would like the fence on top of the brick wall to be taken down, so that just the brick wall remains, so that I will be able to gain the little light that I previously had. This is an incredibly dark basement flat, and I live in virtual black out.
2. Noise pollution.
3. This is a conservation area, and building out in the gardens sets precedents for others to do the same. The basement flats area always at risk of flood, and most of these flats along here have been flooded at some point. Further buildings affect the water table, as more earth is concreted over, etc.
4. I believe it will further curtail my right to quiet enjoyment of this flat.
5. This street has had much property developed, and over the past 20 years has seen property been used as an investment, whereas it used to be a residential street. Further property development for a turnover of profit can only have a detrimental effect on the fragile community that remains.
