Dear Mr Fowler

I write on behalf of the Jessel House Residents Association to convey the deep reservations of the residents of Jessel House, Judd Street to the proposed increase in height of the Town Hall Annexe site.

The current design does not appear to have taken any account of the views expressed at the meeting at the Camden Centre where the developer gave a presentation of their intentions and the overwhelming consensus from the community was that the increase in height was unacceptable so close to the clock tower of St Pancras, one of Londons most well known landmarks, a magnet for tourists and one of the first veiws of many visitors to the Capital as they exit Kings Cross and St Pancras Stations from the Underground, Mainline and Eurostar.

The developer's statement:

"Whilst in some views from the south the additional roof storeys would intrude into the setting of the listed building, the total high has been set so that it does not diminish the dominance of the tower spire as a townscape feature within the local skyline."

is untrue, the dominance of Goerge Gilbert Scott's clocktower will be usurped in all of the views from the South and also from the north, from St Pancras Chambers itself. The most regrettable view will be from the new square outside Kings Cross Station. This roof extension will challenge rather than enhance the facade and clocktower of St Pancras.

This proposed alien insertion into a most sensitive skyline is in stark contrast to the defference shown by the British Library, whose roofline has been kept to a more suitable level.
