Subject: additional historical evidence on Briardale Gardens

Dear Mr McDougall

We wanted to ensure that you had some additional historical information relevant to the application.

A neighbour, a local historian, kindly researched the Metropolitan Archives and unearthed the architectural drawings for numbers 33 to 35 Briardale Gardens, dating back to 1904.

You will see that this clearly shows that both semi detached houses were built with a jutting our rear, and that our own "extension" followed the original outline, as we previously explained.

Our neighbour has also provided further corroboration on the previous use of the land as a brickfield (referenced in our experts' reports).

He was able to find a report in the Counties & Middlesex Counties Courier Gazette of 6 July 1889 concerning the decision of the Hampstead Vestry to place advertisements in the local newspapers asking for evidence, if any, of 'a public footpath leading from Platt's Lane across the brickfield into Finchley New Road'. The brickfield appears on historic maps of the area. The stream running down the back of the Briardale Gardens houses would, we believe, have been the water supply for the brickfield.
