The Cock Tavern 23 Phoenix Road London NW1 1HB

The change of use of upper floors and conversion of attic space to create 5 residential units (1 \times 1 bed, 3 \times 2 bed and 1 \times 3 bed), together with the retention of public house (Use Class A4) to ground floor and retention of function room facility to first floor. Demolition of existing rear extension and construction of new 2--storey extension. Installation of dormer windows to roof level together with internal changes to building.


