The proposal requires some 1059 deliveries or 2118 vehicle movements over a two year period. This compares to the 1260 deliveries for the significant work being done to the 12 ponds on Hampstead Heath. The comparison is important, because on the Heath there is the space to create roadways, use multiple roads, and is spread over all of the ponds. Where a similar exercise is being carried out in a single track road with a requirement for some 50 other residents and a Bowling Club, an allotment's users, this level of activity is simply not workable. In the case of the Heath mitigation was put in place to limit the number if deliveries per site. The applicants swept path analysis clearly shows that there is insufficient space to manoeuvre large vehicles and by implication each delivery will require blockage of the road for up to 40 minutes. Finally this is a quiet road on the edge of the Heath. If each vehicle movement requires half of its time reversing, then 20 minutes per delivery times 1059 deliveries implies that 353 hours of high pitched reversing warning sounds will be required to carry out the development as planned. This together with the other sounds of construction mean that the local environmental ambience and amenity will be substantially reduced. The impact of this will not only be to residents, but to pond swimmers at the ladies pond, and to the various other Heath users and walkers. Please reject this monstrous proposal. The developer needs to find a way of rebuilding ten property with a lower impact on the local area. It can be done as we have seen at Fitzroy Farm and The Lodge.
