

ENGLISH IVY

Many insects also feed on the nectar of its white flowers. Be careful when handling it if you have sensitive skin and loved by Bill Oddie, particularly for providing berries for birds in winter when most others have been eaten trimmed into shape at any time of year. It is a valuable plant for wildlife and is recommended by the RSPB creating a leafy backdrop under clematis and climbing roses that provides winter interest. English ivy can be trained to climb up or spread out along a low wall. Being evergreen, it is perfect for covering pergola poles, or Hedera helix — English ivy can be used to cover a wall in shade where few other plants thrive, it can be


