I have found that the sympathetic, domestic scale of buildings erected by the St Pancras Housing Association and the LCC in that area to be pleasing to the eye. While the intent of building student accommodation and the provision of small flats (provided that they will be for rent or properly affordable) may be laudable, that such a building has to be demolished in the process is to be deprecated. Indeed, 42 Phoenix Road is on Camden's Local List, January 2015, which also acknowledges its heritage value as having provided a caring environment for mothers and their children since the 1930s.
