## Application 2015/7282/P at 325 Kentish Town Road NW5 2TJ

I read in last week's Camden New Journal about this application by Treats for Starbucks and on investigation I find they have applied for change of use from A1 Retail to A3 / A1 Mixed use. I wish to object to this application and urge you to reject it.

I believe the council has a policy of keeping this core frontage at 75% retail. This has worked well in the past and we are lucky in Kentish Town to have some very good retail, albeit precarious. A body of existing retail premises can attract new ones to be established. Allowing the level of A1 to drop by the entry of YET ANOTHER coffee shop/ restaurant would do nothing to increase the attractiveness or vibrancy of the town.
