The absurdity of building a school outside its catchment area but within an area of 37 existing schools.  This is an inappropriate place for a primary school and an inappropriate use of the building. I am surprised that the Mayor, the EFA and the school appear to be treating this as a fait accompli when the application so clearly fails Camden's own test of added congestion in congested areas.

Normal rush hour congestion on the roads and not having a CA-H parking permit will undoubtedly discourage Belsize parents from driving.
					- Pavement Congestion: this is similar to the issue about traffic. I see at Hampstead Hill School that hundreds of people are filing down Pond Street every morning.
