We able to see, enjoyalso know many people within the area (both family, friends, neighbours) who would now be able to walk to, see and enjoy with. This includes a number of elderly people who have limited mobility other than by wheelchair. Today, this is not an option. Furthermore, our son, who is not able to walk yet will be able tot benefit from going outside (within the pushchair) and also be able to leave the property and enjoy in other social and religious events as well as to play with other children during these times. It is also hard to understand for a borough as well regarded as Wesminster, why this is not already available today. There are a number of "eruvs" already available in London, other prominent cities round the world and hence it is difficult to understand why we can not make this available in Westminster. On a practical note, the actual set up of the poles will have virtually no implication to social cohesion or to the landscape. Having walked around Westminster as well as the neighbouring areas to NW8 (e.g. W9, NW6, NW3) etc) I can assure you this will not have any negative implications. Hence, residents and visitors today will hardly if at all be affected.
