					This light disturbance and the accompanying noise that would undoubtedly follow when the court is used at night would make it more difficult to sleep. In addition to this, a fully lit up tennis court at night would be an eyesore as our garden does back onto it and it is clearly visible through our windows.
					The pathway leading to the tennis court shares a wall with our garden, and members are constantly moving back and forth, talking, sometimes staring etc. In the day this is less of a problem, but at night the flow of people using the pathway would obviously cause more of a disturbance.
					In this area there are bats and tawny owls who frequently visit. Both are nocturnal and the erection of the lights would interfere with the ecosystem by altering their perception of night and day-time causing to their hunting habits to become more erratic.
					Given that this is a residential area and the West Heath Lawn Tennis Club is a small private members' tennis club and not a sports center it is hard to see the logic of disturbing residents and wildlife at night for the sake of 140 members who can easily play during the day as they have done for over 100 years previously.
