I am against the application on grounds of:

1/ Effects on other flats/people in the house of building work and excavation of existing garden.

Noise and disruption. Noise will be audible at all levels in the house making it difficult to live comfortably during the day.

(My bedroom window directly overlooks the area in question. Also bathroom window.)

(This flat was renovated extensively within the last 10 years causing serious problems with rat infestation, noise + dirt and disruption to daily living, 6 days a week.)

2/ Excavation of the existing garden which will presumably mean bringing out large quantities of soil etc. from the entrance to lower ground floor, underneath and adjacent to the house door of no. 9.

Disturbance of the ground is likely to result in further rats and ~~insects~~ being dislodged and dirt.

3/ Possible effects on the foundation of the house and drains.

4/ In general, so large an extension appears out of character with the house and terrace and with the existing size and character of the flat.

We have already been through this experience some years ago with house no 3 St Georges Tce. and I have already objected to this proposal (above).

Such works disturb the fabric of the adjoining buildings and cracks appear. These may be filled in but they eventually reappear.

The concrete surface at the back, despite a shallow 'garden', do not allow for proper ground water drainage and lead to water penetration of the fabric. Green slime on the surface does not add to the care of buildings in a designated Conservation Area.
