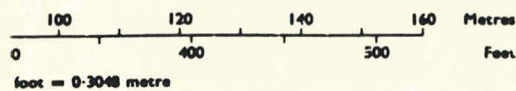

NATIONAL GRID REFERENCE

The grid lines form part of the national grid and are at 100 metre intervals. To give a reference defining the position of a point to within 10 metres proceed as follows:—

EXAMPLE: No 44 NARCISSUS ROAD			
EASTING		NORTHING	
Take west edge of 100 metre square in which point lies and read the figures opposite this line on the north or south margin	252	Take south edge of 100 metresquare in which point lies and read the figures opposite this line on the east or west margin	850
Estimate tens of metres from grid line to the point	1	Estimate tens of metres from grid line to the point	6
