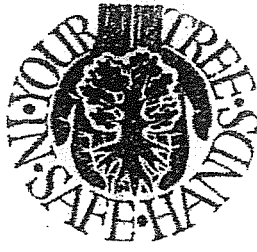

Dear Ms Motlow

Further to my visit yesterday I confirm my advice to you. The 2 Sycamores which I thinned out and shaped about 5 years ago are well and due to the treatment they received are an ~~asset~~ ^{asset} and require very little work to minimise any inconvenience they cause. I recommend that they are thinned again by 20% with minimal lifting & shaping.

The large cherry close to the house has caused substantial damage. Although the thinning and shaping 5 years ago slowed down any adverse effects it had, regrettably it has pushed over the garden wall by several degrees and has seriously damaged the patio which is no longer safe to walk on. I must advise

You to have it removed so that repairs can be completed. Naturally a replacement tree would be appropriate. While a tree further away from the house would be feasible and a smaller ornamental tree desirable. Winter flowering cherries and ~~amelanchier~~ ^{amelanchier} are examples I have planted many times over the years with happy results.
