
## Historic map evidence for oak trees associated with 10 & 10a Oak Hill Avenue being at least 250 years old

Hampstead is fortunate for being surveyed in 1866 for the earliest Ordnance Survey map series. Trees present in 1866 and marked with a special stamp (see below) for significant trees on the 1866 OS map but still existing in 2018 are circled in red on the map section above.

The three oak trees associated with 10 and 10a Oak Hill Avenue can be seen to have previously been significant trees in a field boundary hedgerow to the north of the ancient lane running from Branch Hill, along Oak Hill Way south of Oak Hill House, and on towards the southern part of the hamlet New West End on the Finchley Road. This evidence of existence as significant hedgerow trees in 1866 would indicate it likely that the trees are *at least* 250 years old, hence of local historic importance as well as biodiversity importance for their veteran tree characteristics (and arguably veteran tree status), and thus require extra protection for their roots as in Natural England's Standing Advice for Ancient Woodland and Veteran Trees.

From *Ordnance Survey, Map Makers to Britain since 1791* by Tim Owen and Elaine Pilbeam (pub Ordnance Survey and HMSO, 1992):

'New mechanical devices were invented to speed up the laborious process of engraving, including a spring-punch for hedgerow trees' (page 32) and '.... less detail was shown on the

later 1:2500 maps than on earlier ones.... from 1892 surveyors stopped recording individual trees within hedges' (page 56).


