interesting feature of this design is the actual door. The door void has the usual semi-circular top and in other surviving examples it is practically invariable for this semi-circle to be occupied by a fanlight, leaving a rectangular shape below for the door. But here, the door itself also has a semi-circular top. In accordance with later fashion, such a curve as this would be sawn off and a fanlight inserted
