Dear Tom,
I have quite a rogue sample of self-seeded (or branched out?) sycamore growing right along my perimeter fence. As you can see from enclosed pictures, the sample consists of two branches looking like the hedge rather than a proper tree. With the time this bushy tree has grown into the mesh fence and as I found it has already damage it. The tree is presumably of no value to the amenity of conservation area, caused the damage to the property and will continue and increase damage if left in place. I think that they don't yet have 15 cm DBH.
I would appreciate if you can kindly give me an advice whether under the circumstances Camden's permission should be sought to fell this tree or I can do it without.
