- 1. The opening hours. This is a quiet neighborhood. The existing eateries usually wind down around 9.30-10.00 in the evening. One of them, Kalendar, has even restricted its opening hours and now closes at 7 p.m. With a closing time of 11.30 p.m., by contrast, a fish and chip shop at the Carob Tree, as proposed in the application, would inevitably cater to a much later transient clientele with attendant noise and other pollution issues. It would change the quiet character of the neighborhood without contributing significantly to its amenities. Equally, an opening time of 11.00 am would almost certainly attract students from local schools for lunches. I would be interested to know if the education authorities welcome the idea of pupils being tempted by junk food.
- 2. The character of the area. This corner of Swains Lane/Highgate West Hill has generally been regarded as having a Valilagey1 atmosphere. It is adequately provided with cafes and coffee shops. A major new residential/retail complex is due to be completed soon with proposed outlets including a wine bar on the opposite (north) side of Swains Lane from the Carob Tree. A fish and ohip shop with its attendant lighting would be out of character with the neighborhood and would risk polluting the area with the smell of frying fat.
