There is nothing controversial about Lilian Lindsay. On the contrary, she sounds like a very suitable person to be associated with a SOAS building:

Lilian Lindsay Due Diligence

Nothing adverse or controversial was found on Lilian Lindsay.

Lilian Lindsay OBE, née Murray (1871 – 1960) was a pioneer in dentistry, becoming the first qualified woman dentist and the first female President of the BDA in 1946.

Upon her retirement in 1920, she and her husband, Robert moved to a flat at 23 Russell Square, at the time the headquarters of the BDA, where she established a dental library. She was made honorary librarian of the BDA and taught herself several languages, including French, German, Latin, Spanish and Old English to help her with historical research.

Robert Lindsay died in 1930. Lilian Lindsay remained at <u>23 Russell Square</u> for a further five years. According to English Heritage, she was so devoted to her research that she stayed in London during the Blitz.

Blue Plaque

In 2013 English Heritage placed a blue plaque at Lilian Lindsay's childhood home in Holloway at <u>3 Hungerford Road</u>, but in 2017 the house along with one attached to it was illegally demolished by a development company called Hungerford, for which the company was fined £60,000.

This prompted English Heritage to announce in February 2019 that it was moving Lilian Lindsay's plaque to 23 Russell Square, the former BDA headquarters and where Mrs Lindsay worked and lived from 1920 to 1935.
