				• Tilia x europea, (954/955/956). It is the wrong time of year for pollarding these trees as the nesting season is now well underway. Birds nest every year in the ivy and branches of the three Tilia x europea trees. As I garden close to the lime trees, I've seen and heard nesting birds in those trees over the past few days. These trees should have been pollarded over the winter months, now it's too late in the year and the job should be rescheduled in October 2019 at the earliest.
				• The Sambucus nigra (950) is not damaging the fence. It is a mature tree, planted by the tenant of the nearby flat over 60 years ago and needs renovation pruning, not felling.
				• Malus 951, Malus 1609, Fagus 1608 are all planted and maintained by a nearby tenant. They are very small trees growing in a border next to the building; their presence is not damaging the structure of the building. The border is less than 2m wide so to prune them with 2m clearance would mean getting rid of them. They are not growing over the path or causing obstruction.
				• Prunus avium 965 & 966: these are plum trees growing in a 1.3m wide walled raised border. The branches don't overhand either the road on one side or the border edge on the other side. The only structure they are near is the wall at the back of the border. Giving 2m clearance from that wall would mean felling both these trees and other trees in the same border.
				• 1611, unidentified trees recommended for felling and poisoning. There are no trees in this area, self-seeded or otherwise! Only honeysuckle planted to grow through netting next to the fence.
				There are a number of self-seeded sycamore and beech trees dotted around the estate that need to be felled and poisoned yet which have not been included in this application for tree works.
				I have been a tenant on the York Rise Estate for 17 years and maintain a couple of the garden areas on site.
