Leaves are eaten by the caterpillars of many moth species.</p> <p>T7 Holly. This evergreen shrub is a native plant and the berries provide valuable food for wildlife</p> <p>T8 Lime.</p> <p>T9 yew. The (native and long lived) Yew tree is particularly valuable to wild life.</p> <p>T10 Holly.</p> <p>I also object any shrubs such as the holly being completely removed.
