The major redevelopment had received many objections and one of the key safeguards for the residents at the back of the house on Belsize Park Gardens is the presence of the two large Sycamore trees. It is therefore extremely cynical to try sneakily to materially affect the terms of the original application afterwards with this (separate) application. The report going earlier this year to the Council members to recommend the approval of the application for the demolition of the house at paragraph 10.2 supports "the proposed L-shaped Garden Room [that] has been designed with the retention of the large Sycamore tree in mind." That report also refers to an expert assessment that the construction work will not affect the roots of the tree. It is therefore in my mind illegal to try to get this approval separately from the main application. If the council is too weak to oppose this approach, I will ensure that my legal rights are preserved through the appeal process. (I run a large Government agency and I deal daily with similar attempts to subvert public law.) Separately, even if the house was not in the process of facing a major demolition and development process, it would seem completely irrational for Camden Council, in the midst of a climate change emergency, to accept the removal of two large and healthy Sycamore trees that have been there for decades to simply favour the "landscaping of the garden" at the property.
