Dear David,

Further to my objections about noise, traffic, congestion and pollution—I have now seen a copy of the 'Proposed section through acoustic barrier' (pdf attached).

My wife and I would like to know, is it legal to build a wall of this height, so near to our property, such that it will block light to the basement level and the ground floor of our home?

I'm sure you appreciate that the existing 2m police station boundary wall was built in 1913 and has remained unchanged for over a century. I do not understand how Ridge Property and Construction Consultants can advise their client to double the height of this wall.

David, supposedly, this wall is being built to reduce noise, but according to the report Proposed Development Hampstead Police Station Rosslyn Hill Camden NW3 1PA, Review of Noise & Sunlight Reporting, June 2019, prepared by Southwest Environmental Limited for the Hampstead Committee for Responsible Development, they conclude about the 4m wall that:

'Sunlight to adjacent gardens is drastically reduced by up to 92% by the proposed 4m acoustic wall, which has little noise reduction benefit.'

So the wall would reduce our light, and not reduce the noise from the proposed playground.

We need your help—Abacus Belsize has put forward a proposal which will take away our sunlight—this seems to us unfair and wrong. Is it illegal? And if so, how should we proceed?
