It is an important visual entry into the Conservation Area greatly contributing to the Character of the area. The accompanying structural report identifies the building's foundations sit on shrinkable clay attributing cracks in the building to the location of vegetation in the ground causing variations in moisture content and therefore structural movement of the building. This is given as a blanket statement and does not identify the exact location of cracks and the proximity of the various alleged offending plants and trees and their contribution to the problem. It simply states that removal of planting will solve the problem. If this argument is adopted generally in an area where buildings sit on shrinkable clay, we will be faced with mass defoliation of our Conservation Areas and a huge diminution in their character. No reference is made to the possibility with loss of plants of ground swell due to loss of moisture seeking roots. Neither is there reference to the contribution the planting makes to stabilising the soil on a sloping site. In short, the engineering report does not justify the wholesale deforestation of the site and the loss of a great amenity which adds significantly to the character of the Area. Its approach is "scorched earth." This is an important site at risk. The application should be rejected on the basis that the submitted documents fail tot justify the request for felling.
