While those fellings were ostensibly to protect Gilling Court from root incursion, they were much further away from structures than two in my previous property at Maresfield Gardens for which Camden refused felling. This next felling is the third of five proposed, and has no structural reason, but appears to be in support of a development. While records are scarce, it would seem that a property business acquired most of the Gilling Court freehold some years ago and is implementing plans benefitting the business without regard to hundreds of tenants and even more neighbours, including me. The loss of five mature trees for unnecessary, even unwanted development is not to be borne.</p> |
